Community

The word 'Community' speaks for itself. Literally meaning 'together' (prefix *con*) 'in service' (*munis*). King Charles III's hopeful legacy following his coronation was that the nation could be more united in service, something that was expressed in 'the Big Help Out' campaign.

Since arriving in Offwell, and whilst ministering in Widworthy, Wilmington and Farway I have been struck by the sincerity of our desire to find and build community. Events held over the Coronation weekend were a wonderful example of this. Tea Parties in Farway and Offwell, BBQs in Offwell (I think I did ok on the 'bucking bronco ride!') and Wilmington were amazing community events that brought lots of people together, fortified friendships and created a few new ones too. The whole weekend was really encouraging, especially in light of how in recent years 'community' has felt harder, especially during the pandemic.

Doing community can feel harder at times because people on the whole are having to work for longer, and households are having to depend on two incomes. People on the whole have less time than they used to. Charities have felt the pressure too, as they've struggled to recruit volunteers, and community organisations have been left vulnerable as more people are finding it harder to make regular commitments. It seems to me we are moving away from an 'association' driven sense of community to an 'event' driven sense of community. In other words, we recognise that it is difficult for people to commit to something on a regular basis but when there is an event that inspires enough of us we make space in our lives to make full use of the opportunity.

As a side note, the word 'opportunity' comes from the Latin phrase, ob portum veniens "coming toward a port" which refers to a favourable wind blowing ships into the harbour. Think of an opportunity as something a good wind blew your way.

Our villages are good at catching that favourable wind, like the Jubilee last year and the Coronation this year. I wonder if we can create opportunity?

One thing that Jesus was able to do incredibly well was to bring people and groups that were previously alienated from one another back together. Gentile and Jew, pharisee and sinner, guest and host, and friend and stranger. The New Testament gives it a word 'Koinonia' meaning fellowship, and it became the template for the first church in Jerusalem two thousand years ago.

Over the coming months we have a lot to look forward to in our villages. You should expect to see me enjoying the opportunity to come 'together in service'.

THAT PENTECOST EXPERIENCE



"On the day of Pentecost, seven weeks after the resurrection of Jesus, the believers were meeting together in one place. Suddenly there was a sound from heaven like the roaring of a mighty windstorm in the skies above them and it filled the house where they were meeting. Then, what looked like flames or tongues of fire appeared and settled on each one of them. Everyone present was filled with the Holy Spirit and began speaking in other languages as the Holy Spirit gave them this ability."

Acts 2:1-4 (New Living Translation)

Can you remember your Pentecost moment? It's something you can never forget. Some of us remember where we were when President Kennedy was assassinated. More of us remember the exact moment we heard of the death of Princess Diana but can you remember where you were when you felt that rushing wind, tongues of fire or waves of peace, calm and stillness, when you were changed for ever on that day when the Holy Spirit entered your heart and mind and soul?

Jesus had gone, fifty days after His resurrection, now ascended and returned to His Father but he'd sent another to be with His followers. The Holy Spirit is the third part of the triangle (the Trinity) that is God. The Spirit is His life-giving power – the bit of God that dwells inside us, spurring us on, bringing us comfort, guiding us in what to do – making us more like Christ.

The Holy Spirit appeared like "tongues of fire" on their heads and set the disciples ablaze. It was the Tower of Babel reversed (Genesis ch.11). At Babel humans clambered up to be near God but here, God has already come down to be one of them. Now all the nations could understand each other. Now language was not a barrier.

The Holy Spirit sent the disciples out to talk about all they had seen and heard to spread the Good News and the Spirit empowered them to live God's way. God made his presence known to this group of believers in a spectacular way – violent wind, fire and His Holy Spirit. Would we like God to reveal Himself to us in such recognisable ways? He may do – or maybe not. Elijah needed a message from God (1Kings 19:10-13), experiencing a great wind, earthquake and fire but God's message came in a gentle whisper. God may use dramatic methods to work in our lives – or He may speak in a gentle whisper. We just need to wait patiently for God and always listen.

Our Christian faith is not limited to any race or group of people. Christ offers salvation to all people regardless of who or what they are. Those visitors in Jerusalem were surprised to hear the apostles and others speaking in languages other than their own but they need not have been. God works all kinds of miracles to spread the Gospel, using many ways and languages as He calls all kinds of people, not just a select few, to become His followers. No matter what your race or language, your education or status in society, God speaks to us through a raging furnace or a gentle whisper – and when the Holy Spirit enters your life, you're never the same again.

Are we listening for our Pentecost moment? Have you had your Pentecost experience? Ask God to pour out the Holy Spirit in your life – it's too good to miss!



"Father God, we pray that as we celebrate Pentecost, we recognize our utter dependence on You and stand overwhelmed by Your power. We praise You that on this Day of Pentecost, Your promise of the Holy Spirit is for us today. May we know and experience what it means to be filled with the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the life-enhancing power and presence of the Holy Spirit. May He empower us to live in You. Amen."

Coronation Tea in Offwell - Sunday 7th May 2023

120 villagers attended Offwell's Coronation Cream Tea on Sunday afternoon. As the church bells rang out the clouds parted and guests were welcomed into a village hall resplendent in, what seemed like, miles of red, white and blue bunting. Sewn and knitted by Annette Warne this bunting has been displayed over the years at all the Offwell Jubilee celebrations for Queen Elizabeth II. A splendid five foot crown and royal garland, displayed on the stage, were made by Viki Whitehead and red, white and blue was in abundance everywhere, including the bowler hats.





The scones and cakes were donated by the villagers with cream, jam and sundries sponsored by the Parish Council and the Flower Show committee. There was a game of Pin the Jewel on the Crown for the young ones and Wrap your Daddy up as a Mummy, which, as you can imagine, provided much hilarity. Some of the children read a poem about the Coronation and there were two winners of the Make a Crown competition. All the children received a commemorative coin. Around 20 families took part in a King themed quiz and a game of Irish

Coronation Reflections by Pam Staunton

I'm still feeling a glow from the celebrations of the Coronation weekend. For some of us (10% of the population) it was the second coronation we'd experienced in our lifetime. I was very young when Queen Elizabeth ascended to the throne. Very few people owned a television back then but we were invited by a family friend. I remember there were a lot of people but my young brother and I had front



seats – on the floor. I think we were given a toy to play with, but that was an age when children were taught to behave and although I'm sure we were bored out of our minds, behave we did. The television was tiny, the images black and white and it meant very little to me.

The coronation ceremony represented the culmination of 1,000 years of history, tradition and symbolism, taking place in Westminster Abbey where every monarch has been crowned since 1066. In a spectacle on the grandest scale King Charles III was crowned Monarch of the United Kingdom. The Crown Dependencies and the British Overseas Territories and head of the Commonwealth.

So many things have changed beyond imagination in the years between the two coronations; the advancement of modern technology has paved the way for multifunctional devices, mind boggling, intimidating and overwhelming for some of us. Now most people own at least one television, some very big. The recent coronation was shown on enormous screens at numerous venues all round the world. In her first few years the Queen sent out around 400 congratulatory telegrams to subjects who had turned 100. The corresponding figure in 2020 was 16,254.

In an ever-changing world it is reassuring that some things remain the same. It's comforting to hold on to familiarity, to tradition, to the values we hold dear to us. Over two thousand years ago another king was born, Jesus Christ, the King of Kings, the Lord of Lords. No pomp, no ceremony and ultimately his throne was a cross, his crown thorns. But to this day he is worshipped around the world. His love for us is steadfast and unchanging. He cares for us, wants only good for us and promises us everlasting life. He's there for all of us. We don't have to swear allegiance to him, all he asks is that we love him and love one another as he loves us.

Preparing for the future whilst preserving the past

WE ARE PREPARING TO RENOVATE AND REORDER THE INTERIOR OF ST MARY'S CHURCH. WE ARE SEEKING YOUR SUPPORT TO WIDEN THE NAVE AISLE, REESTABLISH THE FONT TO ITS ORIGINAL POSITION AND REPAIR MANY OF THE BOX PEWS.

The work will enable us to provide greater hospitality to visitors and worshippers during events and services. By widening the nave aisle our ability to host funeral services and weddings will be enhanced giving enough space for two people to walk side by side, and for those with mobility restrictions greater access. The renovation work to the box pews will ensure they can continue to be used for years to come. The repositioning of the 15th century font to the south aisle will return it to its original location, but will also create space for groups to meet, and hospitality to be provided.




Unfortunately, the project will be extremely costly in time and money and therefore we seek the support of our community as well as visitors, and through charitable grants.

One piece of work currently underway is a pew timber survey, being conducted by a consultant specialist for the conservation of historic timber. In this survey the reconfiguring of the pews will be planned in such a way that limits harm and keeps the integrity of the original panelling. Once this has been carried out, the Parochial Church Council will be asking the Diocesan Advisory Committee for their recommendations prior to the faculty application being submitted to the Chancellor. We hope that by the end of the summer we can

then move forward with fundraising and making early preparations for the work to be carried out.
